Strategic Assessment of Onslow County, North Carolina

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Executive Summary

The Onslow County Schools Head Start 2019 Community Needs Assessment provides information and analysis on issues relating to early education and economic, health and social factors in the program's core service area of Onslow County, North Carolina.

The following report is the collection and analysis of information on the needs and characteristics of the service area of Onslow Schools Head Start as well as the resources available to meet these needs. In addition to meeting federal regulations for Head Start/Early Head Start Programs to prepare a comprehensive Community Assessment every five years, the following report is an integral part of the agency's planning process. The Community Assessment is the basis for designing plans, choosing community partners, forming essential collaborations, implementing comprehensive services to meet the needs of low-income children and families, and make decisions about changes needed in program design and services.

Vision:

To become the model of excellence for Head Start Programs in North Carolina.

Mission:

To ensure that preschool age children are "school ready" as they transition to kindergarten, thus enhancing the opportunity for a successful school career.

Methods

Methods for Conducting the Community Assessment

The methodology used in conducting the Community Assessment employed the following processes to enable Onslow County Schools Head Start to effectively and comprehensively develop programs addressing the needs of eligible children and families:

- A non-profit professional was contracted to plan and implement the Community Assessment process. The contractor interpreted the data, prepared it for presentation so that the data could be utilized in determining the direction for the program going forward. Administrative team members were consulted as well.
- Demographic data was collected and reviewed from federal, state, and local sources for the county served.
- Community partner's data was obtained based on the most up-to-date information on their assessments of conditions and changes in Onslow County.
- The Head Start Program Information Report (PIR) from 2017-18 was reviewed to determine possible trends or areas of concern.

Research and data gathering is an on-going process. Each year updates are completed on the general demographic and programmatic data to ensure that the most current information available is used to identify needs and set goals for the organization.

The analysis process included data from program staff, community partners and public databases such as the most recent data from the NC Justice Center, Prevent Child Abuse North Carolina, Onslow County Schools, NC Department of Public Instruction, US Census, NC Child Health, NC Child, Kids Count, NC Department of Commerce, NC Department of Workforce Solutions, Onslow County Community Health Assessments. The collected data was reviewed and interpreted by a qualified professional; feedback was obtained from administrative staff; and results were presented to Policy Council and Board of Directors. Specific issues were identified, and tentative recommendations made for addressing these issues.

Summary of Findings

Based on the 2019 Community Assessment, the following recommendations and implications may be followed to design plans, make decisions about changes needed in the program, and implementing services to meet the needs of children and families:

- 1. As the birth rate in Onslow County is almost twice the state average, there will need to be a determination of need and capacity to expand services as currently a relatively small number of children are receiving Head Start services compared the total number of eligible children.
- 2. As Onslow County is in a hurricane prone area, emergency preparedness, resources for recovery and family support are essential when providing services for young children and their families, especially those experiencing poverty. The program might consider a plan for service delivery and resource support in the event that natural disasters develop in the future.
- 3. The increasing Hispanic population continues to be a significant trend that will need to continue to be addressed by the Head Start program. The Hispanic population is growing steadily every year. Based on the 2017 Onslow County births, Hispanic births make up the largest minority group birth rates in the county.
- 4. The opioid crisis is significantly impacting Onslow County. It not only impacts the adults engaging in usage but very young children. This assessment assumes a correlation between the high rate of substance use disorder to the increased rate of child neglect, foster care placement and child birth and health outcomes.

Service Area - Onslow County

History

European, mainly English settlers arrived here in 1713 in what was originally part of the colonial precincts of Carteret and New Hanover. Onslow County was formed in 1734 and was named for Arthur Onslow, the longest serving Speaker of the British House of Commons. After a lethal 1752 hurricane, the county courthouse was relocated from Town Point to Wantland's Ferry; this settlement was eventually incorporated in 1842 and named Jacksonville after President Andrew Jackson. Through much of the first half of the 20th century, the county was largely rural, with an economy based on agrarian and maritime communities.

During World War II, Onslow County was dramatically changed in the early 1940s with the establishment of the United States Army Camp Davis near Holly Ridge (now defunct), and the creation of Camp Lejeune in 1941. This increased county population and generated related growth in housing and businesses.

More about Onslow County

Located on the coast of North Carolina, Onslow County has a population of just fewer than 200,000 with 70,000 of those residing within the city of Jacksonville. While the county is home to beautiful beaches, productive farmland, and a thriving retail sector, it also hosts one of the largest concentrations of Marines in the world. Camp Lejeune and Marine Corps Air Station New River are located entirely within the borders of the county, which accounts for the county's median age of 26, its male majority population, and almost seven in ten residents being military-affiliated. The bases employ 35,792 active duty military members, 5,904 reserve/guard personnel, and 5,810 civilian employees. Family members and retirees add another 77,000 people that are military-affiliated. Many military families live in Onslow County for only a few years, creating an ever-changing and diverse community but presenting the challenge of newcomers being unfamiliar with the resources and services available to them. These military families are often far away from "home" and the support structure that parents, grandparents, siblings, cousins, and friends can provide, which necessitates the community building an infrastructure of support and assistance.

Recent Occurrences/Natural Disasters

Onslow County was significantly impacted by Hurricane Florence. Onslow County declared a mandatory evacuation on September 11, 2018. This hurricane was one of the mostly costly in United States history. Onslow County alone sustained hundreds of millions of dollars in damage, with the Onslow County Schools initial estimates topping \$125 million according to reports (Jacksonville Daily News)

Hurricane Florence, a large and slow moving category one hurricane, made landfall during the morning of September 14, 2018. After the eye crossed Wrightsville Beach, NC at 7:15 a.m. the storm spent the next two days producing record-breaking rainfall across eastern North Carolina and a portion of northeastern South Carolina. Over 30 inches of rain were measured in a few North Carolina locations, exceeding the highest single-storm rainfall amounts ever seen in this

portion of the state. A station in Loris, SC recorded 23.63 inches rain, setting a new state tropical cyclone rainfall record for the state of South Carolina.

Record river flooding developed over the next several days along the Cape Fear, Northeast Cape Fear, Lumberton, and Waccamaw Rivers, destroying roads and damaging thousands of homes and businesses. A USGS report indicated nine river gauges reported floods exceeding their 1-in-500 year expected return intervals. Although Florence will be remembered primarily for its record-breaking flooding, wind gusts over 100 mph caused significant damage to buildings, trees, and electrical service across the Cape Fear area, and a storm surge of over four feet eroded beaches and damaged property between Cape Fear and Cape Lookout.

The state of North Carolina reported 42 fatalities due to the hurricane and preliminary damage estimates of \$16.7 billion. An estimated 74,563 structures were flooded and 5,214 people were reportedly rescued from flooding. (National Weather Service)

Government

Onslow County is a member of the regional Eastern Carolina Council of Governments.

The structure of local government in Onslow County was changed in 2016 to have seven commissioners in 2018 Board of Commissioners, all elected at-large for four-year terms. In contrast to electing members from districts, this structure means that candidates are elected by the majority population in the county, which gives a more accurate view of the entire electorate. On November 8, 2016, citizens voted in favor to alter the number of commissioners from five commissioners with concurrent terms to seven with staggered terms. In 2018, citizens elected two more county commissioners in the general election on November 6, 2018, to four-year terms. The citizens of the county will elect five commissioners in 2020; however, the four candidates that receive the highest number of votes in the general election of 2020 will receive a four-year term and the candidate who receives the fifth highest number of votes in the general election of 2020 to a two-year term. Thereafter all county commissioners would be elected to serve four-year terms. The Board establishes policies and ordinances implemented by the County Manager and his staff. Commissioners are Jack Bright (Chair), Royce Bennett (Vice-Chair), Paul Buchanan, Robin Knapp, Mark Price, Tim Foster, and William Shanahan.

In the North Carolina Senate, Onslow County is located in the 6th Senate District, which shares its borders with Jones County. The 6th Senate District is represented by Republican Harry Brown. In the North Carolina House of Representatives, Onslow County is split into 3 House districts with the 14th and 15th House Districts completely in Onslow County and the 4th House District in part of Onslow County and all of neighboring Duplin County. The 4th District is represented by Republican Jimmy Dixon, the 14th District is represented by Republican George Cleveland, and the 15th District is represented by Republican Phil Shepard.

The main law enforcement agency for Onslow County is the County Sheriff's Department. The elected sheriff is Hans Miller.

Military Presence

The county is proud to be the home of Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune and Marine Corps Air Station New River. Known as the "Home of Expeditionary Forces in Readiness" and with its close proximity to ports at Wilmington and Morehead City, Camp Lejeune is the oldest Marine

Corps base in the state. Its primary purpose is to train and maintain combat-ready units for expeditionary deployment. It is the second largest military base in North Carolina. Almost seven in ten residents being military-affiliated. The bases employ 35,792 active duty military members, 5,904 reserve/guard personnel, and 5,810 civilian employees. Family members and retirees add another 77,000 people that are military-affiliated. The median age is 25.8 years with 31% of the population ages 0-18 and 24% ages 19-29 years. There is a projected increase in the population of 7.0% since 2010. (Onslow County Health Assessment 2018)

Population Data

The proportion of residents that identify as White is larger in Onslow County (76.4%) as compared to North Carolina (71.0%) and Health ENC counties (63.8%). Onslow County has a smaller share of residents that identify as Black or African American (15.9%) when compared to North Carolina (22.2%). The Hispanic or Latino population comprises 12.2% of Onslow County, which is a higher proportion than the Hispanic or Latino population in North Carolina (9.2%) (2019 Onslow Community Health Assessment).

Demographic and Other Population Data

Onslow County (according to US Census Quick Facts)

- The population is 197,683.
- 52% of residents are female and about 48% are male.
- In 2017, about 76.2% of residents are White.
- 15.9% are African American.
- 12.8% are Latino.
- In 2017, about 24.5% of the population is under 18.
- 8.8% of the population is age 5 and older.
- About 17.5% of population is retirement age (65 and older).

Education

Onslow County Schools

Onslow County is situated on the east coast of North Carolina and is the proud home of US Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, the largest amphibious Marine base in the world. Officially established in 1734, Onslow County encompasses over 767 square miles and has a population of over 177,000 people according to the 2010 US Census - an increase of over 82% over the past 40 years! Named for President Andrew Jackson, the county seat of Jacksonville was incorporated in 1842.

Our 2017-2018 student population is approximately 26,000 and we currently have 38 educational facilities which include 20 elementary schools, 8 middle schools, 7 high schools, 1 early college high school, 1 early childhood development center, and 1 alternative learning program. With our

region's average growth of 300 plus students per year, the Onslow County School system has had to provide additional classroom space for our county's youth. The average age of all facilities is 40 years with our newest school, Dixon Middle School, opening in August of 2017. (Onslow County Schools website)



Graduation Rates

The 2017-18 four-year cohort graduation rates for Onslow County Schools was 88.9% compared to the state average of 86%. This is a drop from the 89.5% rate for the previous school year. (*NC Child*)

Health and Medical Care

Health Factors

Residents not associated with the military are more likely to be economically disadvantaged and lack health insurance. One in four residents live in rural areas of the 767 square mile county, and those that lack transportation may struggle to access services. The National Center for Veterans Analysis and Statistics projects that Onslow County has 31,458 veterans; the Urban Institute estimates that 11.8% of the veterans in North Carolina are uninsured.

Birth Rate

Birth rates are important measures of population health. The birth rate is usually the dominant factor in determining the rate of population growth; however, population growth is also driven by the age structure of the population (e.g., deaths), immigration and emigration. The birth rate in Onslow County (21.2 live births per 1,000 population in 2016) is higher than the birth rate in North Carolina (12.0). Birth rates have decreased slightly over the past three measurement periods in all three jurisdictions. (North Carolina State Center for Health Statistics)

Health Coverage

According to NC Child, 14,932 people in Onslow County have no health insurance. Uninsured rates are highest among those working in the construction, retail and food service industries. These fields rarely offer health insurance. In Onslow County, 35.6% of the working population are employed in one of the aforementioned industries. (NC Child, 2019)

Obesity

- Between 2017 and 2018, adult obesity in Onslow County decreased from 30% to 27.9%.
 This decrease is a good start to overcoming the obesity epidemic affecting the entire United States.
- There was improvement in physical inactivity which declined from 24% of residents being inactive in 2015 to 21% in the 2017, according to the County Health Rankings data.

Other Health Factors/Substance Use Disorder

The opioid crisis has reached national, state, and local epidemic levels. From 1999 to 2016 more than 12,000 North Carolinians died from opioid-related overdoses. This epidemic is devastating families and communities. It is overwhelming medical providers and is straining prevention and treatment efforts. (North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services) In 2015, Onslow County had 15 opioid related deaths. Jacksonville in Onslow County ranks in the top 12 (of US cities) for opioid abuse. (Castlight)

Economic Data

Median Household Income

Households in Onslow County, NC have a median annual income of \$48,162, which is less than the median annual income of \$60,336 across the entire United States. This is in comparison to a median income of \$46,786 in 2016, which represents a 2.94% annual growth. (*Census Bureau*)

Poverty

14.1% of the total population for whom poverty status is determined in Onslow County, NC live below the poverty line, a number that is higher than the national average of 13.4%. The largest demographic living in poverty are Females 25 - 34, followed by Females 18 - 24 and then Males < 5.

The most common racial or ethnic group living below the poverty line in Onslow County, NC is White, followed by Black and Hispanic. (Census Bureau)

Food Insecurity

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is a federal assistance program that provides low-income families with electronic benefit transfers (EBTs) that can be used to purchase food. The goal of the program is to increase food security and reduce hunger by increasing access to nutritious food.

Food Stamps

The numbers above are from the May 2019 report from the NC Division of Child Development and Early Education. There are 3,772 children enrolled in child care in the county. 59% of children enrolled in regulated child care are age three to five in Onslow County. (NC Division of Child Development and Early Education). According to Onslow County Department of Social Services, as of July 15, 2019 there were 473 children in total on the subsidy waitlist.

CHILD CARE OPTIONS

The Head Start Performance Standards require programs to assess the number of child care and early education options for children in the program service area. The following information from the North Carolina Division of Child Development and Early Education shows that as of July 2019, there are 70 state licensed child care centers and family child care homes in Onslow County, North Carolina. The star rated license designation is also included. In North Carolina, 5 star is the highest quality designation for child care centers and homes.

Military Child Care Resources and Services

Lejeune-New River's Child & Youth Program (CYP) offers safe, high quality childcare for infants and children ages 6 weeks to 12 years old. The Department of Defense partially subsidizes some of the cost of care, and family fees are based on total household income for full-time childcare.

Federal Poverty Guidelines

As aforementioned, Head Start is a school readiness program for lower-income children and families age three to five. Federal poverty guidelines are the threshold used to determine income eligibility. The **poverty guidelines** are the other version of the federal poverty measure. They are issued each year in the *Federal Register* by the **Department of Health and Human Services** (HHS). The guidelines are a simplification of the poverty thresholds for use for **administrative** purposes — for instance, determining financial eligibility for certain federal programs.

The poverty guidelines are sometimes loosely referred to as the "federal poverty level" (FPL). The following figures are the 2019 HHS poverty guidelines which are published in the Federal Register

Programs using the guidelines (or percentage multiples of the guidelines — for instance, 125 percent or 185 percent of the guidelines) in determining eligibility include Head Start, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), the National School Lunch Program, the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program, and the Children's Health Insurance Program. (United States Department of Health and Human Services, 2019)

Number of Head Start Eligible Children in Onslow County

As aforementioned, the estimated number of children (based on US Census estimates) ages birth to five in Onslow County is 22,400 . In addition, the estimates are that 18.3 % of children in the county live in poverty (KIDS COUNT). This means that there are approximately 4,110 income and age eligible children for Head Start and Early Head Start in Onslow County. Approximately 2,000 of these income eligible children are age three to five. With an enrollment of 175 center based slots, Onslow County Schools Head Start is serving less than 10% of the Head Start eligible child population.

In 2017 (the latest year where state data is available), there were 4,060 births in Onslow County. 68% were Caucasian, 15% were Hispanic/Latino, 13% were African American and 4% were other races. (NC State Center for Data Statistics, 2019).

Based on the number of annual births in Onslow County, the following is the approximate breakdown for eligible children age birth to five:

- 1 year olds 1,111
- 2 year olds 743
- 3 year olds- 758
- 4 year olds- 687
- 5 year olds- 621

Poverty by Zip Codes

Within Onslow County, zip code 28543 has the lowest median household income (\$31,640) while zip code 28582 has the highest median household income (\$76,821). The corresponding percentages detail the percentage of residents with incomes below the state median income.





Foster Care

Head Start Performance Standards require that all children in foster care be considered categorically eligible for Head Start services, regardless of income. As of May 2019, there were 225 children in foster care in Onslow County. 83 or 36.89% of these children were age birth to five. This represents the age group with the greatest number and percentage in care. The chart below shows the age and race breakdown of those children under the care of the state.

According to NC Child, the rate of children in foster care was 9.4, per 1,000 in 2017. This was up from the 2016 rate of 8.8 per 1,000.

Children with Special Needs

Head Start Performance Standards require 10% of funded enrollment be comprised of children with a diagnosed disability. Each grantee has to develop systems and partnerships to ensure this standard is met. This includes collaborations with community agencies and service providers to obtain referrals. Onslow County Schools is the Part B provider and LEA for children three to five. The following is the data for the county:

According to NC Child, 3.6% of children in Onslow County did not have health insurance in 2018.

Teen Pregnancy Rates

The teen pregnancy rate was 8.2 per 1,000 in 2017. This was a decrease from the 2016 rate which was 8.6 per 1,000. (NC Child)

Child Abuse and Neglect

The rates of reported child maltreatment have gone up in Onslow County for each of the last 3 years. The total reports for the period of June 2017 to June 2018 was 3,555. (UNC Jordan Institute for Families)
